As cities across the U.S., including Lawrence, are in the unenviable position of having to make tough decisions about spending priorities, it is vital that city leaders and citizens remember the essential roles that the Arts play in strengthening our community.

- The arts fuel an economic engine in Lawrence that employs workers, encourages tourism, and generates sales of goods and services throughout the community. Nationally, non-profit arts organizations and their audiences generate \$166.2 billion in economic activity every year*.
- The arts are one of the primary tools used to market and promote Lawrence to businesses competing in the new economy, families, and prospective college students. The arts attract a skilled, educated, and diverse workforce to the community. That, in turn, brings new businesses looking for creative talent.
- Students with an education rich in the arts have better grade-point averages, score higher on standardized tests, and have lower drop-out rates across all socio-economic categories.
- The arts improve our quality of life by giving form to our shared histories and common aspirations. They ennoble us as people and help to build bridges between cultures and generations.
- The arts help animate democracy by offering unique programs, settings, and creative approaches that reach new and diverse participants, stimulate public dialogue about civic issues, and inspire action to make change.

I understand that the City is forced to make plans for cuts if the Governor takes back the liquor tax. I certainly realize the need to find funds to support many state programs and understand some of the problems that the Governor, legislature, and city commissioners have to identify what programs to cut or to cut back.

That said, I would like to encourage you to support the city band concerts. I am in the city band and enjoy playing and, as far as I can tell (I sit in the middle of the trumpet section and rarely see anyone), many in the town enjoy the concerts. I have always thought of the summer band concerts as one of the unique events that make Lawrence a special town.

As a taxpayer, I feel that it may be appropriate to reduce the appropriation and I would be happy to reduce my small "pay" (if others do so). I also feel that complete elimination of the \$ 12,000 program will stop the band concerts but would not provide much to help other programs.

My only other suggestion is to try to find ways to save Prairie Park. I've only been there once but it seemed like a special place and it certainly is a place that was, on my visit, filled with young children.

Where to cut? I cannot offer advice because I don't know the programs well enough. I am disappointed that the proposed cuts do not deal with the high school athletic fields. For the city to have wasted money duplicating what already was available at Haskell is, in my mind, pretty sad. But this does not seem to be part of your meeting on Tuesday. For now, please consider my plea to keep the city band concerts and, possibly, the prairie park nature center.
