The homeless outreach team continues to see limited resources available as they attempt to assist Douglas County residents avoid becoming homeless or find affordable housing. We have had some successes with both HPRP programs through the LDCHA and Kim Wilson Housing in Wyandotte County. The team has attempted to continue to outreach people despite the many new referrals they have been receiving from within Bert Nash and citywide. One outreach attempt is to try to start working with homeless individuals in the Douglas County Jail as part of the County's re-entry initiative. This quarter, an outreach worker has made several trips to the jail to try to engage with people prior to their release. The re-entry program has recently been awarded grants to hire their own case managers. The outreach team will work closely with the re-entry team to help wrap services around homeless individuals being released from the jail.

The team currently consists of three full time workers. This quarter saw a transition of one team member. We were able to hire someone who has worked in the community providing services to homeless individuals so that transition has been relatively smooth. We also have a master's level KU student working on the team, a first for homeless outreach.

The team is looking forward to the Homeless Summit next week and hopes to come back with renewed energy and commitment to working with homeless individuals in Lawrence.
