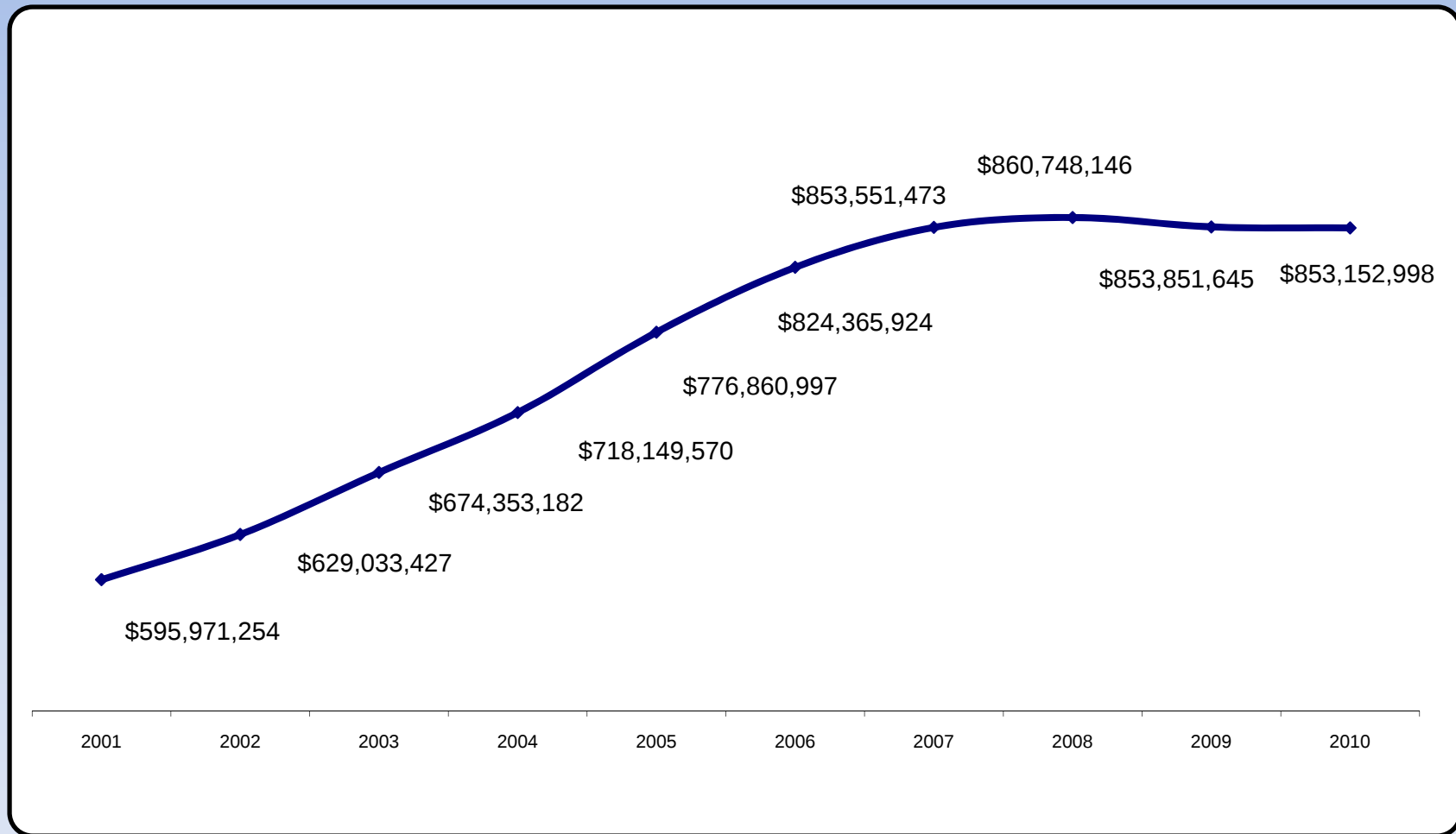

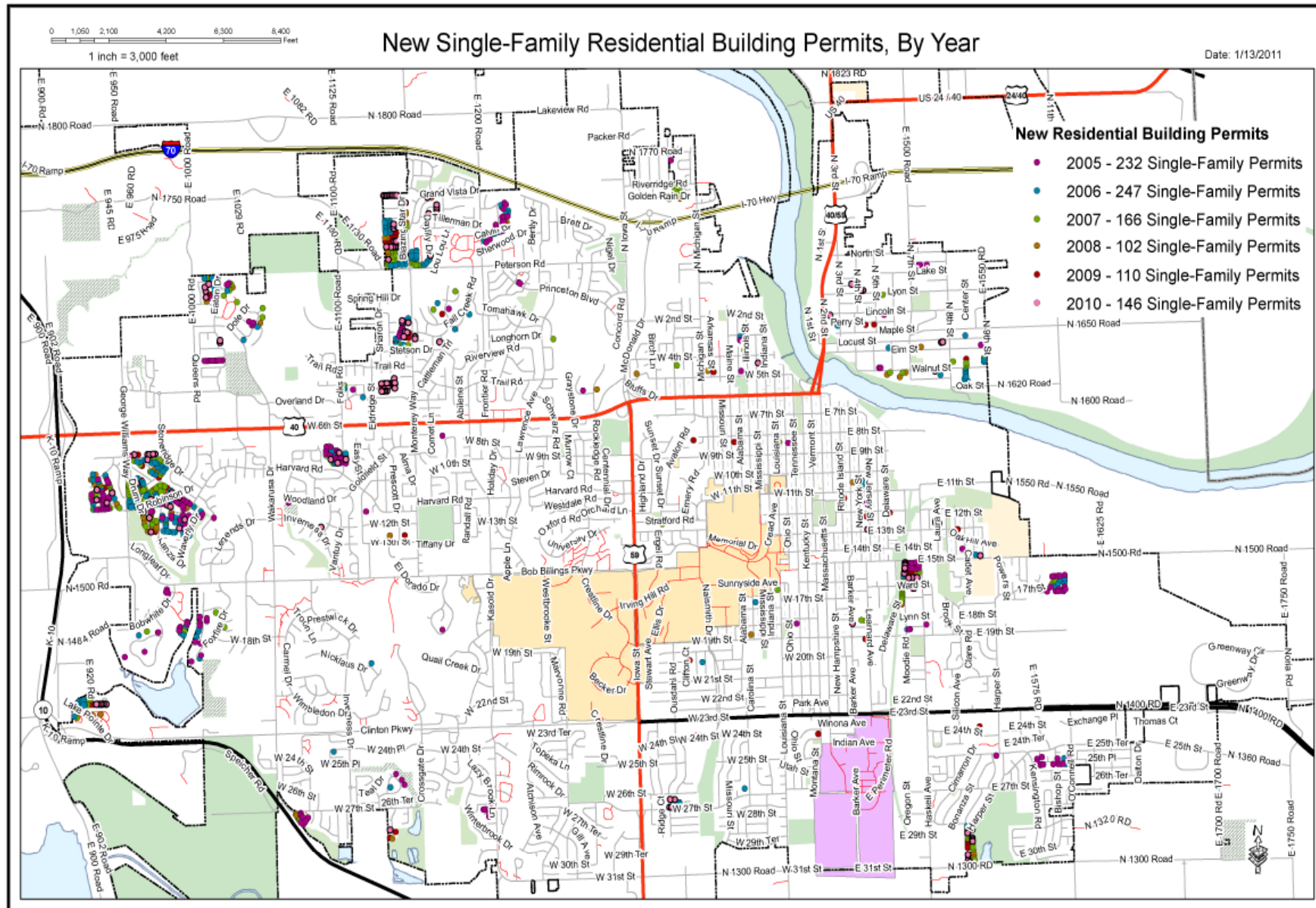

Assessed Valuation Trends



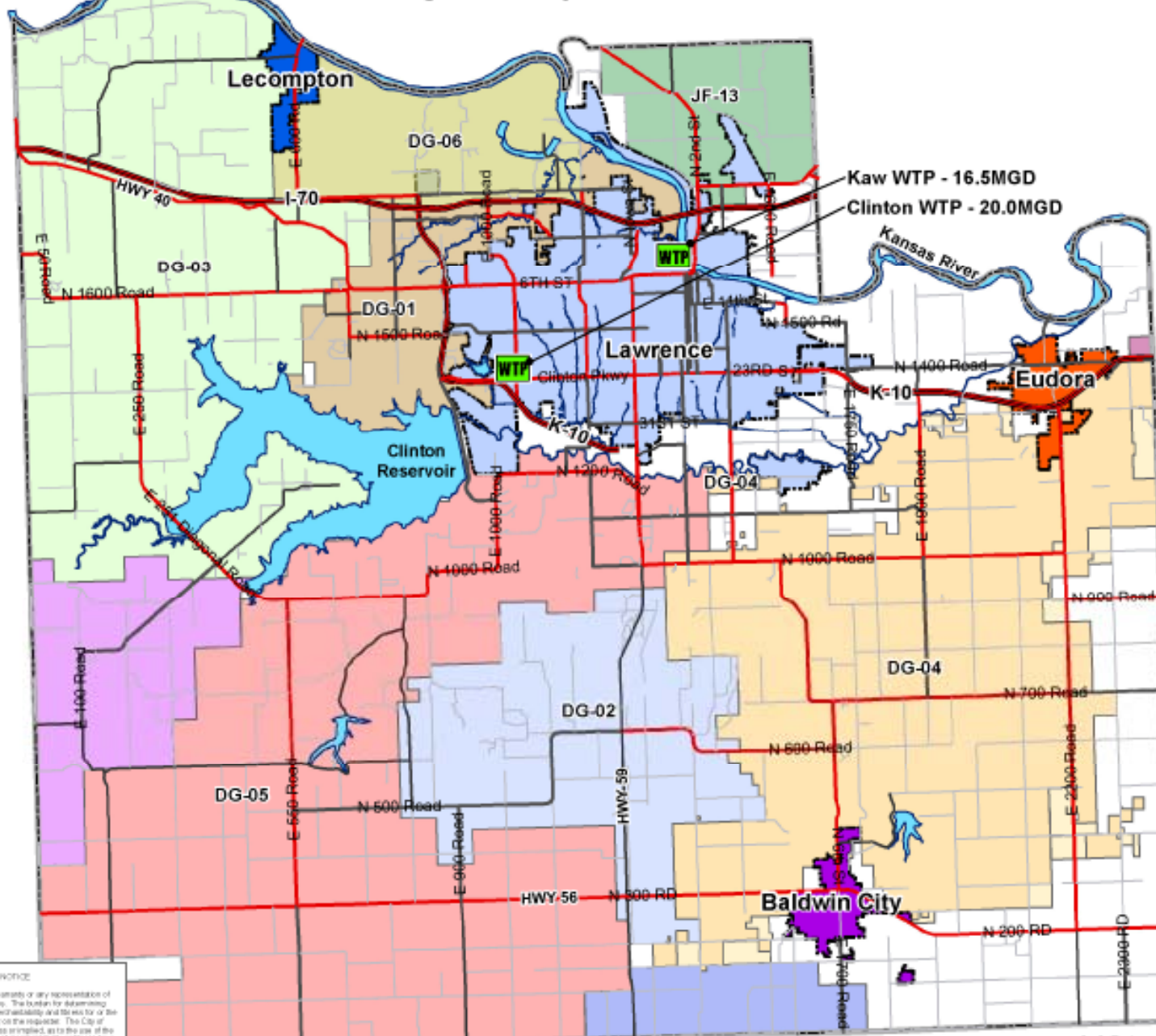




Douglas County Water Service Areas

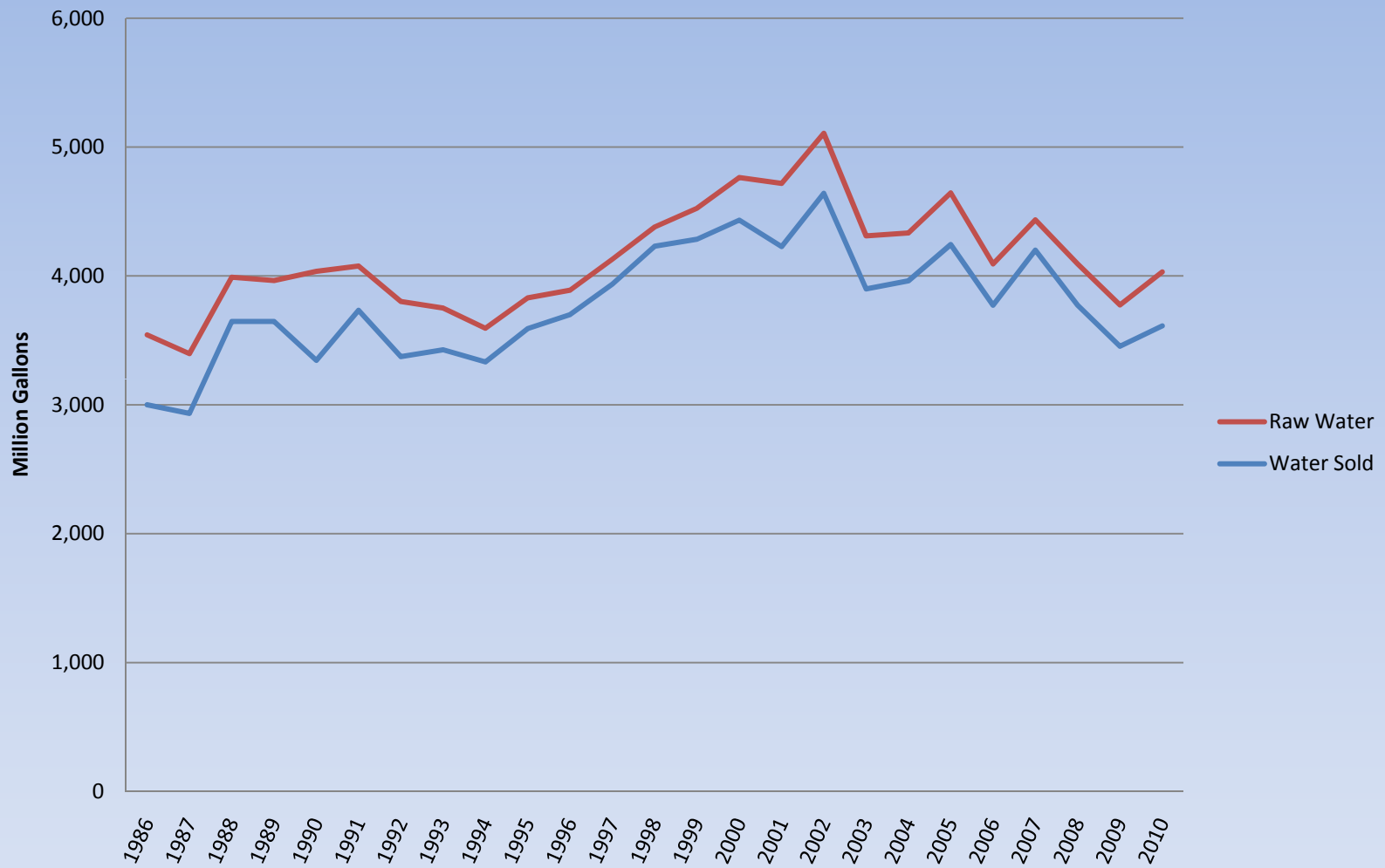

Water Personnel Costs



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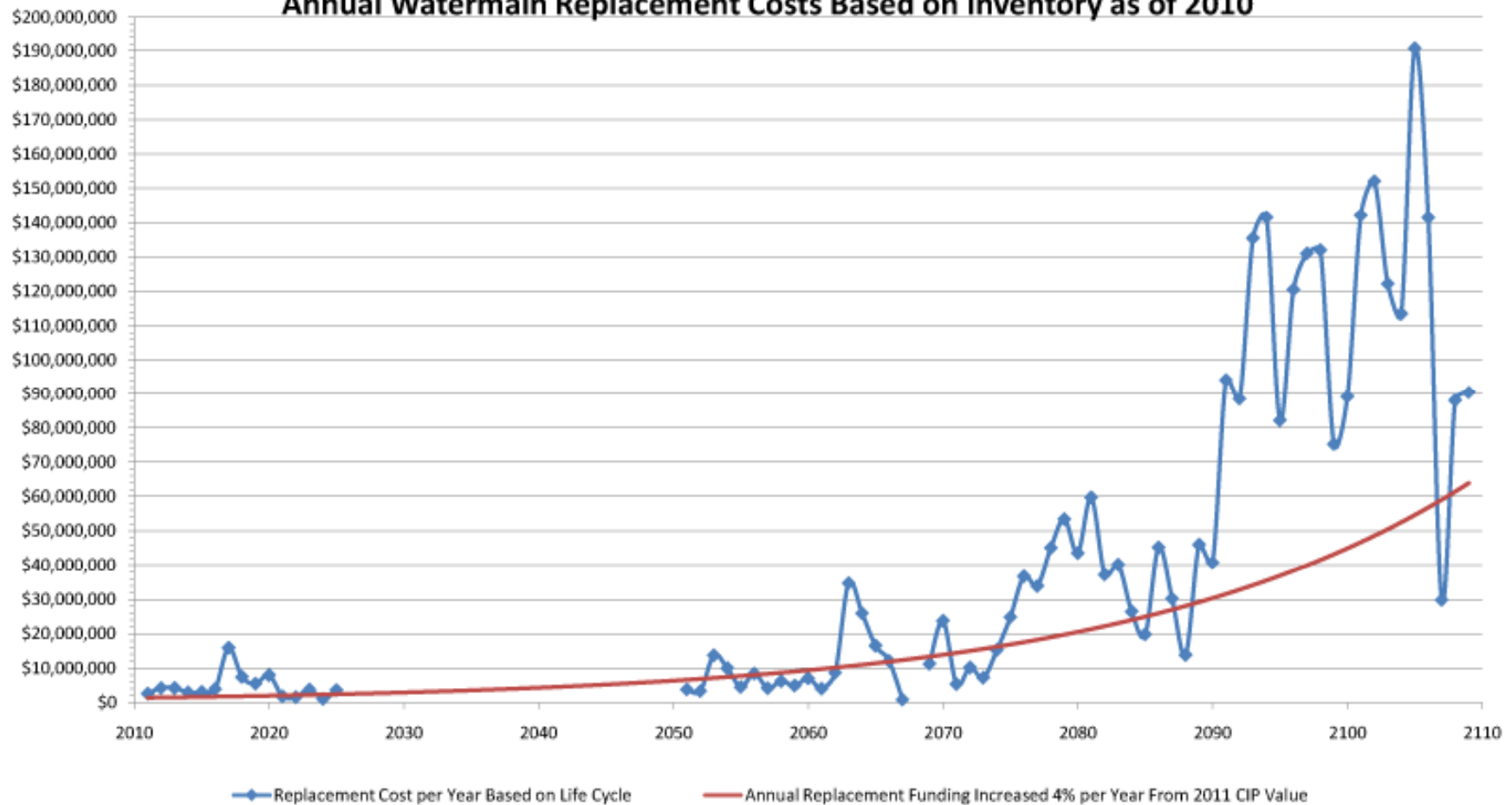
Water Chemical Costs

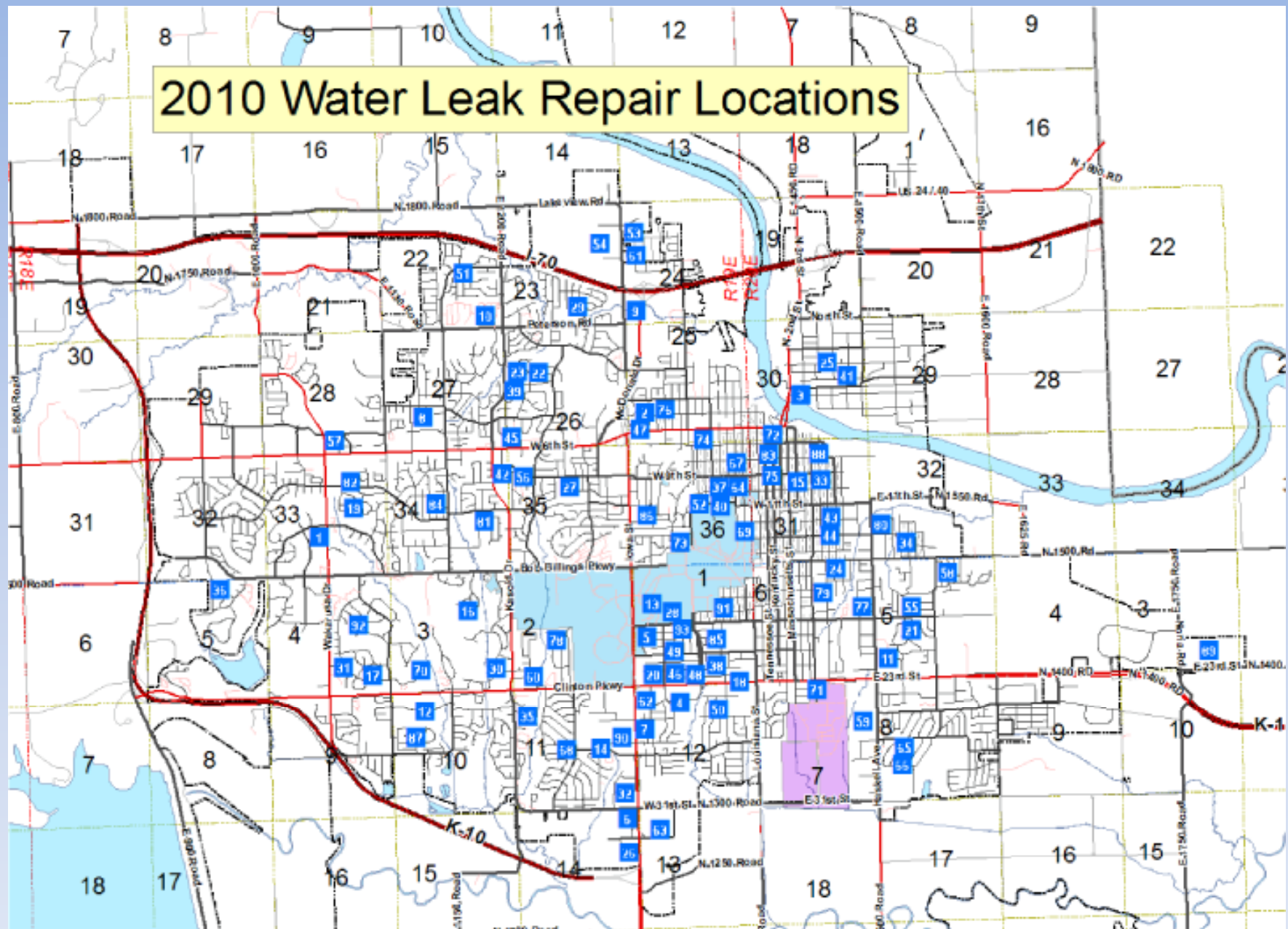
