6. Architectural Significance

This exuberant, 1 1/2 story, Victorian house has high architectural integrity, representing the epitome of Queen Anne residential architecture. Its elevated site, diagonal orientation and entry to the street, gables and dormers reaching in every direction, modified octagonal porch and tower, and copious mix of architectural expressions, fine materials, and articulated building elements accentuate the desired complexity of the exterior. The interior spatial arrangement of double parlors and dining room that focus on a grand parlor staircase provide a panoply of original woodwork, fireplaces, built-ins, paneled pocket doors, brass hardware, colored glass, tiles, pressed metal ceiling and light fixtures.

7. Historic Significance

Andrew J. Griffin, one of Lawrence's most celebrated early businessmen, succeeded against unpredictable downturns of the business cycle. He fought in Ohio during the Civil War, and then moved to Lawrence in 1867 where he began a lime and stone business, adding coal later. In 1892, he paid the disgruntled laborers of the Polar Ice Company and established the Griffin Ice Company among more than a dozen other ice businesses in the city which he slowly bought up. He purchased a Hercules ice-making machine in 1894 and in 1896 Griffin, J. D. Bowesock, Junius Underwood, and W. L. Howe chartered a new company, doubling the capacity of the ice house. It was lost in the 1903 flood. By 1909, the company was again making 50 tons of artificial ice a day with two plants and 20 employees. The last ice plant, located at 616 Vermont and razed in 1994, covered 15,000 square feet.

I am pleased to write in support of the nomination of 645 Connecticut Street, otherwise known as the A.J. Griffin House, to the Lawrence Register of Historic Places. I am proud to have owned the A.J. Griffin House for the last thirty years. It is well documented that A.J. Griffin was an important business and civic leader in Lawrence during the turn of the previous century. Moreover, the home he built contains many unique architectural elements that are very well documented in the application. Its elevated location, on a prominent corner in the East Lawrence neighborhood, makes it a well recognized and iconic neighborhood landmark. In fact, a line drawing of the home is included in the publication of the East Lawrence Neighborhood Plan adopted, I believe, in the 1970's. This designation is long overdue.
