Background

➤ City of Lawrence

- Sixth largest city in the State of Kansas
- Only municipality in the top ten largest cities in our state without a patrol service dog unit
- Only agency in Benchmark City Survey without readily-accessible patrol service dog resources
- No staffed patrol service dog unit in Douglas County

Background

- Depend on outside agencies for PSD assistance on nearly a daily basis
 - Criminal and violent offenders
 - Locating and recovering critical evidence
 - Lost children, elderly, disabled, or suicidal persons
 - Location of illegal narcotics

Functions of the Patrol Service Dog

PSDs are primarily used as LOCATING tools and offer several useful functions on Patrol:

- Responding to alarm and prowler calls
- Searching areas for discarded/concealed evidence
- Narcotics / explosives detection
- Tracking / apprehension of dangerous criminal offenders
- Locating lost or missing persons
- Deterring criminal activity
- Enriching the law enforcement relationship with the local community

Benefits of the Patrol Service Dog

- Effectiveness
 - No machine exists that can match a dog's olfactory capabilities
- Potential for reduction in use of force
- Officer safety
 - minimize risk to human officers
- Potential for worker's compensation cost reductions
- Agency patrol resource savings
 - Highly effective, especially w/ searches

Lawrence Data

- Patrol – ?
- CIP Unit – Needed over 200 times
 - K9 Responded 53 times
- Armed Felons @ Hy-Vee Gas Station
- Topeka Homicide (Cpl. Harwood)
- Robbery @ W 4th St/Michigan St
- ZERO instances where K-9s used as force tool

Moving Forward

- Selection process for officers and supervision
- Travel to kennels for selection of the K-9s
- Selecting a local veterinarian and boarding service for contract
- Equip 2 existing patrol vehicles for PSD use

Training

Kansas Highway Patrol K-9 Academy:

- Certification from a recognized agency and within the State of Kansas
- K-9 operations based in Topeka, Kansas
 - Topeka PD also certifies through KHP
- 10-week K-9 Basic Handler Academy
 - High-demand, limited openings
 - March 2015
- Academy/Training/Certification is FREE
