More than 12,000 people visited on opening day for a ribbon cutting with Mayor Mike Amyx, performances by local musicians, and a community relay featuring 200 citizens passing the final book from the library's temporary location to the newly expanded and renovated library at 707 Vermont Street. It was a great day for our great community.

Our community's shared vision of creating a library for the 21st century is moving forward at full speed. Lawrence Public Library has become our city's primary destination, bustling with vibrant energy. It is the spot for people of all ages to connect, converse, read, and reflect. The library cultivates an inquisitive, engaged, and literate community and provides the tools necessary for people to create and share their own stories.


Friends & Foundation

The Friends of the Library and the Library Foundation raise supplemental funds for library needs not covered by the annual budget. The Friends raise money for essential library programs such as Read Across Lawrence and Summer Reading, while the Foundation applies for grants and focuses on long term projects.

Highlights from 2014:

- The Library Foundation provided \$1 million in capital campaign funds and in-kind contributions for the construction of the new library.
- The Friends provided \$48,600 to support Read Across Lawrence, Summer Reading and other essential library programs.
- The annual Ross and Marianna Beach Author Series, funded by a grant from their family foundation, debuted October 22. National Book Award winner James McBride traveled to Lawrence for an incredible evening of words and music.
- The Friends of the Library began a new operation selling books on Amazon, earning a total of \$11,594 in 2014.

thoughts and feelings. The library was able to offer this to her at a very early age, even before she could stand up and walk, and continue it through every stage of her life so far.





While I was planning mom's 100th birthday party I thought it would be nice to record her life story. I asked my kids if they had




