Action: Jon Marburger presented the construction costs from bids received for the 2018 Sidewalk Gaps and ADA Ramps & 2017 CDBG ADA Ramps and Haskell Crossing. Recommended approval of \$200,000 of 2019 Pedestrian/Bicycle Funds to complete construction of 2018 Sidewalk Gaps and ADA Ramps project.

Commissioner Bowen did not want to spend 2019 dollars on 2017 and 2018 projects. The thought was that doing the entire block might be cheaper that gaps.

Moved by Commissioner May, seconded by Commissioner Bryan to approve \$200,000 of 2019 Pedestrian/Bicycle Funds to complete construction of 2018 Sidewalk Gaps and ADA Ramps project. Motion passed 7-1 with Commissioner Bowen opposed.


History

- October 2016 City Commission directed staff to develop program
- March 2017 Staff presented sidewalk hazard mitigation policy to the Commission.
 - Action was Deferred
- March 2018 Staff presented a revised policy to the City Commission.
 - Direction was given to proceed with the program
- August 2018 City Commission funded the 2019 program year.
 - \$800,000 for financial assistance and cost-sharing grant programs
 - o \$200,000 for hazards that are the City's responsibility to repair

Sidewalk Inventory's

- Staff conducted an inventory in 2006.
- Staff conducted 2nd Inventory to update condition in 2014.
 - Walked all sidewalks and provided more detailed info including GPS location of deflections and repair costs.
 - o 203,608 LF of defects
 - o 3760 non-compliant ADA ramps (of 7454 total)
- Inspection of zone 1 2017, reviewed 2018
 - Generally West of Wakarusa and North of Bob Billings
 - 430 hazard defects identified
 - o 25 ADA ramps with hazards

Current Zones



2019 Program Timeline

- First notice to property owners go out in March,
 2019
 - o 60 days to complete the repairs
- City soliciting bids, March 2019
- City to begin work to repair their hazards
 - o March / June 2019
- Hazards not completed by the property owner will be completed by the City through condemnation
- Cost for repairs will be assessed to property owners taxes


Financial Aid and Grant Assistance

- Financial aid for those properties that qualify
 - Residential owner occupied
 - Meet the HUD guild lines (80%)
 - No cost to the property owner
- Grant cost-sharing assistance (50/50)
 - Residential owner occupied
 - Two or more adjacent sidewalks
 - Owner must prepay for their share
- Property owners will have the ability to utilize the City's contractor
 - Same pricing as the City

<u>Steve Evans' Thoughts on Chair Position and Conducting Monthly Meetings</u> February 9, 2019

"If I had an hour to solve a problem and my life depended on it, I would use the first fifty-five minutes determining the proper question to ask, for once I know the proper question, I could solve the problem in less than five minutes."

- 1. Focus on each commissioner's participation including the context of one's area of interest and organization represented. How does everyone prepare for meetings?
 - a. Keep in mind that the engineers are the professionals, we are not the experts on each and every issue and should think about how the issues relate to our area of interest and in general to the community.
 - b. The best preparation may not be coming to meetings with minds made up but bringing an open mind along with a list of questions for staff and others on the T Comm.
 - c. I have observed BZA and Planning Commission meetings and am impressed with their preparation and engagement in discussions. I intend to "go around the table" asking for questions/input from each commissioner on all agenda items. My questions might include:
 - i. How does this relate to health and wellness issues in the City?
 - ii. How does this the relate to the school district, students moving about the City, SRTS, etc.
 - iii. How does this relate to KU, students moving about and living in various parts of the city, bike share programs, using public transportation, etc.
 - iv. This in terms of your area of interest and also in general terms.
 - v. It is okay to pass, comment on what others have stated or ditto.
- 2. How do we relate to public participation and input?
 - a. General Public Comment. This section has always seemed awkward to me. It is difficult for most people to do this and to get a simple thank you may be best most of the time, but I think "minimal" interaction with commissioners is okay too. I am comfortable facilitating this so it does not get out of control.
 - b. Consider how the agenda item process has occurred in the past and how this might be improved.
 - i. Staff presentation
 - ii. Commission guestions (Not Discussion?)
 - iii. Public comment (I'd promote more interaction, but it needs to be controlled by Chairperson; BZA experience)
 - iv. Discussion
 - v. Action if required, motions and seconds (for the video record raise hands and speak up)
- 3. What is the Transportation Commission's purpose in the larger sense?
 - My personal experience in Davis, CA in 2016; it's taken fifty years to get where they are today.
 - b. Small steps are fine, we really can contribute to where Lawrence will be in fifty years and what do we want it to look like?

Subject: Updating the Non-Motorized Project Prioritization Policy

David and Jessica: I would appreciate it if this email could be shared with Transportation Commissioners before or at their retreat. Thanks.

Dear Transportation Commissioners:

I would like to recommend that the Transportation Commission consider updating the current non-motorized project prioritization rubric to take a more holistic view of projects' overall community benefits. In particular, I recommend that you consider revising the bikeway scoring policy this year to capture the recreational, cultural, community building and economic benefits of projects, as well as their transportation benefits.

The City's current strategic priorities include sound financial stewardship, in which "decisions are made by prioritizing across all government services considering needs...." The current bikeway prioritization rubric rightly considers transportation-related factors such as adopted bikeway plan priorities, bicycle demand, and safety. However it does not look across all government services, as called for in the City Commission's strategic plan. A more inclusive rubric would also factor in a project's value to the community as a recreational facility, a cultural event space, and a tourism asset. I believe City Commissioners would appreciate recommendations from you that consider all of these factors.

Projects to complete sections of the Lawrence Loop are examples that may stand to benefit from a more holistic scoring rubric. City surveys, and public input related to the Lawrence Parks and Recreation Master Plan, consistently show that citizens want the City to make trail development a high priority because trails support transportation, health, community building and economic well being.

In an email exchange with Amanda Sahin last month, I was told that no updates to the prioritization rubric would be made until 2021. I ask that you consider revising the policy sooner so that City Commissioners receive the best advice possible on funding non-motorized projects in 2020 and beyond.
