Section 4. Statement of Problem/Need to Be Addressed By Program

A. Provide a brief statement of the problem or need your agency proposes to address with the requested funding and/or the impact of not funding this program. The need for scholarship support continues to grow with expansion of classes at the Lawrence Arts Center. As costs for basic needs such as food, housing and gas rise, more and more families are facing tough economic challenges. We are requesting City support to allow the Arts Center to continue to provide opportunities for all members of this community to participate in art, dance and drama education. Current policy provides financial assistance based on a sliding scale of income to determine eligibility. This scale is in line with federally established poverty guidelines. The Lawrence Arts Center uses the same income guidelines as USD 497 in determining eligibility for the free and reduced lunch program. In fiscal year 2006-2007, the Arts Center awarded \$54,020 in scholarships to 695 students, which represents an increase of 23% over last fiscal year, and 4% of our total annual budget. The need for scholarships continues to grow, and it is our commitment to make the arts accessible to all people regardless of socioeconomic status.

The Lawrence Arts Center serves the general population of Douglas County and surrounding rural communities. According to the US Census Bureau's 2005 data, the population of Douglas County is

102, 914, and the client population of the Arts Center is consistent with the population of Douglas County which is:

B. How was the need for this program determined?

The need for the scholarship program was determined by the tracking the number of financial aid requests received, demographic diversity of our students and meeting the needs of partner community organizations. In addition, scholarship funding fulfills the Arts Center's commitment to enriching the lives of individuals and the community by nurturing a love of the arts through education, exploration, and expression. The Lawrence Arts Center welcomes people of all ages, abilities and socioeconomic levels.

C. Why should this problem/need be addressed by the City? The Lawrence Arts Center fulfills the mission of the city to *provide excellent city services that enhance the quality of life for the Lawrence community*. City support enables the Arts Center to continue to offer financial aid to qualifying students who want to participate in classes and activities. Building relationships with underserved populations is an important commitment the Arts Center has to the community and City support enables us to do this.

Section 4. Description of Program Services

The Lawrence Arts Center will provide approximately 750 scholarships to low income youth and adults across all education programs. Last year, 5097 student enrolled in 895 classes and the Center provided 695 scholarships. Scholarship support is critical for the Center to be accessible to all members of this community. In addition, we have partnered with organizations to facilitate enrollment in classes as to performances. Scholarships give organizations like Big Brother Big Sisters and opportunity for the adult and youth participants to take a class as part of their activities together. We also coordinate with Douglas County CASA, the Resident Services Offices at the Lawrence-Douglas County Housing Authority, Bert Nash, Juvenile Detention Center, USD 497, Boys and Girls Club, Head Start, Little Nations, Ballard Center, Immanuel Lutheran Childhood Center, CASA, Bert Nash, Big Brothers Big Sisters, and Cottonwood, Inc. These partnerships

involve scholarship, fee waivers and financial aid to offer art, dance and drama classes to underserved members of this community.

B. Describe any efforts your agency has made to explore the community to determine if there are any other agencies providing similar types of services. What efforts have you made to coordination services?

There are no other organizations in this community that provide the same programs and educational activities as the Lawrence Arts Center. As stated above, we work diligently with community agencies to facilitate access to our programs and classes. Our partnership and coordination with community organizations extend beyond classes to include use of our facility for meeting space, exhibition, and public events.

Section 5. Program Objectives
