Amur Honeysuckle Lonicera maackii

A large shrub from eastern Asia, that has become highly invasive in eastern and central U.S.A. It is rampant in Lawrence.



Some states have already banned it



Why is it so invasive?

It chokes out other plants by:

- leafing out earliest in Spring
- growing very rapidly
- producing 1 million berries per shrub
- birds spreading berries all Winter
- root toxins inhibiting adjacent plants

How big a problem is Amur Honeysuckle in Lawrence?

- It is in virtually every neighborhood.
- The largest stands are in older affluent neighborhoods Sunset Hills, Deerfield, Hillcrest, Pinckney, Old West Lawrence.
- Many residential streets have it in the right-of-way.
- It is in every City park, except the most formal ones.
- It seems to have been planted as an ornamental in the older "flagship" parks – Holcom, Clinton, Centennial.
- It is extensive in the "nature" parks Prairie Park, Naismith Valley Park, Billings Nature Area, Brook Creek Woods, Burcham Park, Martin Park.
- Rock Chalk Park and the new Lawrence Nature Park are just beginning to be infested.
- At least one local nursery is still promoting and selling it.

Recommended Response Plan

- Declare an ecological emergency. Designate Amur Honeysuckle as a noxious weed for eradication.
- Charge Parks & Recreation Dept. with eradication by uprooting, or by cutting/stump herbicide, on yearly schedule - before the berries mature in November:
 - Year 1: all nature parks, with trained volunteers
 - Year 2: all formal parks, and street rights-of-way
 - Year 3 and beyond: mop up, monitor, maintain
- Hire two Program Managers for three years, and five Forestry Laborers (March-November) for three years.
- Inform and instruct the public through City media.
- Pass ordinance requiring it be removed from private property, with fines kicking in after three years.
- Coordinate with Douglas County and K.U. to achieve complimentary efforts.
