Item 1



- Life cycle for refuse trucks
 - Varies per vehicle, but on average it is 10 years
 - Cost of fleet is approximately \$10M
 - Average replacement per year needed to maintain current fleet is \$1M
 - Some increases assumed for inflation
 - Fleet is behind, therefore some catch-up is required



- Use of Transient Guest Tax Funds
 - Charter Ordinance 30 sets forth how TGT Funds can be used and states in part:
 - Moneys in either fund shall be expended for such purposes as the City Commission determines promotes, enhances, maintains, or improves the tourism, visitor, or convention business of the city.
 - Carnegie Facility Staffing
 - Partnership between tenants (eXplore Lawrence) and Parks & Recreation staff to ensure that the facility has staff present for all reservations



- Jail Rate
 - City receives a daily jail rate from the County annually
 - The daily jail rate for 2020 is \$97.11 per municipal inmate per day
 - Municipal inmates are tracked (and therefore reported to the City for payment) by the day, even if they are there just a few hours



- Operating cost of adding Fire Station No. 6
 - Approximately \$2.5M annually
 - Includes 21 FTEs to staff facility
- Utility Billing Round Up
 - Still determining feasibility, once known staff will bring back a recommendation
- Arts Center Annual Financial Audit
 - Rent figure will be included



Follow-Up Action Items

- Authorize the Mayor to sign a letter to the Lawrence Arts Center regarding their annual financial audit.
 - Inclusion of fair market value for use of Cityowned facility

 Formal rate model will be completed in 2020 and used to develop future rates



Solid Waste Rate Summary

- 3% increase is \$0.56 per household per month
 - This is an increase of \$6.72/year

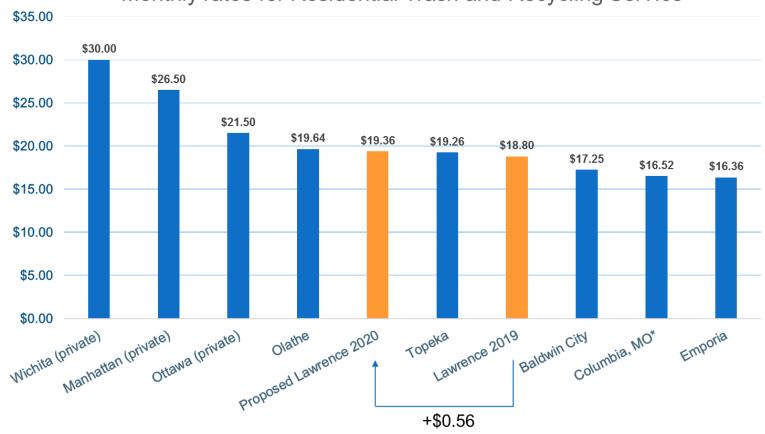

Stormwater Rate Summary

- 3% increase for stormwater rates
 - + \$0.13 per Equivalent Residential Unit per month
- Anticipated to generate an additional \$99,000 in revenue for 2020
- Formal rate model will be completed in 2020 and used to develop future rates



Stormwater Rate Summary

- 3% increase is \$0.13 per ERU per month or \$1.56/ERU/year
 - 1 ERU is 2,366 sq. ft. of impervious surface

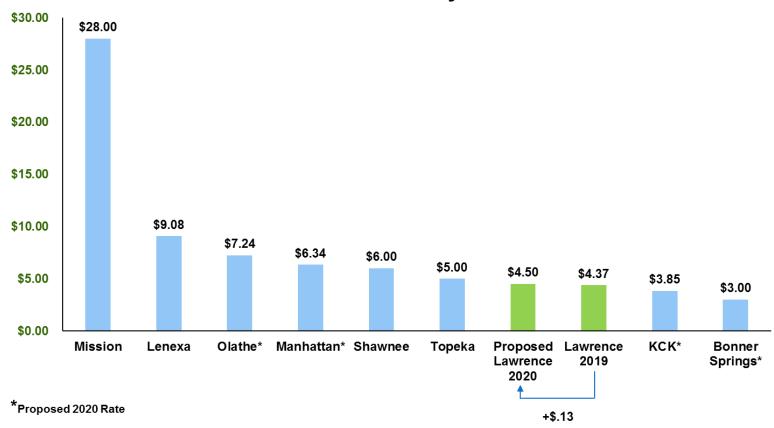

Water & Wastewater Rate Summary

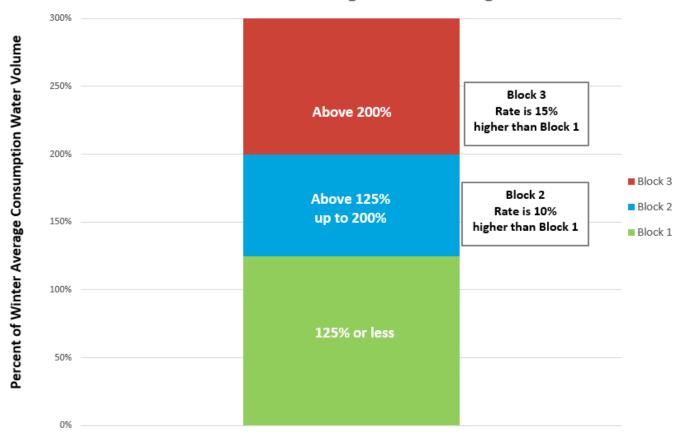
 The new residential billing rates will use an Individual Inclining Block rate based on the Winter Quarter Average (WQA)

 WQA is the monthly average usage computed based on water usage for the billing periods falling in the months of December, January, and February

- Additional Considerations
 - The published County budget does NOT include the Fire Medical portion of the Internal Service Funds
 - This would be a revenue reduction of \$233,000 in the General Fund
 - If the mill levy was increased to cover this operating cost, it would equate to 0.218 mills
 - Site improvements for the Training Burn Tower project are still undecided
