Electronic Recycling and Document Shredding Event Scheduled for May 4



The City of Lawrence will host an electronic recycling and secure document shredding event on Saturday, May 4th from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. in the Free State High School north parking lot, 4700 Overland Drive.



Items accepted for recycling include confidential paper documents (maximum of 10 boxes), televisions, video and audio equipment, computers, printers, scanners, fax machines, microwaves and other small appliances, batteries, cell phones and other hand held devices. There is a \$10 recycling fee per computer monitor and a \$15 recycling fee per television. There is no recycling fee for other electronic equipment. Fees may be paid by cash or check.



Items not accepted at this event include large appliances and household hazardous waste such as fluorescent light bulbs, paint, pesticides and compressed gas cylinders.

Electronic recycling at this event will be provided by Secure e-Cycle and secure document shredding by PROSHRED.

City to Hold Rain Barrel Workshop in May



The City of Lawrence Stormwater Division works to educate residents about techniques to divert stormwater and use the water efficiently.

The City of Lawrence Stormwater Division will hold a Rain Barrel Workshop on Thursday, May 9 from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. at the Douglas County Fairgrounds, 2110 Harper Street, Building No. 1.

A rain barrel collects and stores rainwater from your rooftop for use in your yard or garden. Water collected in a rain barrel would normally flow through your downspout, onto a paved surface and eventually into a storm drain. Instead of the rain water going down the drain, you can capture the water and use it for many uses including filling bird baths, watering indoor, garden or container plants, and cleaning garden tools. Rainwater is naturally soft and contains no minerals and chemicals. When used for watering plants, rainwater will leave no calcium carbonate residue. Rain barrels help lower water costs - it is estimated that 40% of water used during summer is for lawn and garden maintenance. Rain barrels reduce stormwater runoff resulting in fewer pollutants in our storm water and less potential for localized flooding.

For the class on May 9, participants can choose to either make a rain barrel at the class and take it home for a \$35 materials fee or participants can come and observe the workshop free of charge and take home the informational material to make a rain barrel at home with products you have already.
