Moving this month? Tips from the city to make your move easier.

July and August are peak months for moving out of apartments and homes in Lawrence. Moving can create a lot of waste. A little planning and preparation goes a long way toward reducing the amount of waste your move produces. Here are a few helpful tips:

REDUCE the amount of waste generated by using reusable or recyclable padding like towels, cloth napkins or newspaper to pack your boxes instead of purchasing Styrofoam peanuts or plastic wrap.

DONATE gently used clothing and household goods to local charities or hold a moving sale. Donate non-perishable food to local food banks, pantries and shelters.

RECYCLE obsolete electronic equipment, cardboard boxes, newspapers, plastic bags and all other recyclable materials. Visit www.LawrenceRecycles. org for recycling information.

PROPERLY DISPOSE of paint, automotive products, household cleaners, pesticides and other potentially hazardous chemicals at the City of Lawrence/Douglas County Household Hazardous Waste Facility. Call (785) 832-3030 to schedule a drop-off appointment.

longer usable, such as couches, appliances and automobile tires, by submitting an online request form available at www.lawrenceks.org/swm or calling (785) 832-3032.

Garden Hoses & Rope



Do NOT place garden hoses and other rope-like items in the your blue recycling cart. These items are not recyclable and create issues at the recycling sorting facility.

A garden hose can easily wrap itself around the sorting equipment at the Material Recovery Facility (MRF). This may damage the sorting equipment. There is also significant loss in productivity at the facility when handling unacceptable items.

When no longer usable, place garden hoses and other rope-like items in your green trash cart for landfill disposal.

Explore new trails this summer

Burcham Park River Trail: This 0.64 mile multiuse path runs along the Kansas River, connecting Burcham and Constant Park.

Burroughs Creek Trail Extension: This project adds concrete surfacing from 23rd St. to 29th St.

Baldwin Creek Trail: This 0.7-mile recreation path will start on Queens Road and head along Baldwin Creek until it meets the newly constructed trails in Rock Chalk Park.
