Riding the bus gives kids the freedom to get around in the summer. The Student Summer Bus Pass is a great way for kids to get to the pool, community centers, parks, the library and shopping.

It is easier than ever to purchase the Student Summer Bus Pass. Beginning April 17, the bus passes will be available at many locations around town including:

Electronic Recycling Event May 20

The City's Solid Waste Division will host an Electronic Recycling Event on Saturday, May 20th from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. in the KU Park & Ride east parking lot, accessible from Clinton Parkway and Crestline Drive. Electronic recycling will be provided by Surplus Exchange.

Items accepted for recycling include televisions, video and audio equipment, computers, printers, copiers, scanners, fax machines, microwaves and other small appliances, cell phones and other hand held devices. There is a \$20 recycling fee per CRT computer monitor, CRT television, and rear projection television. There is no recycling fee for other electronic equipment. Fees may be paid by cash or check.

What about household goods and bulky items? We recommend donating or selling your items for reuse. Check out Facebook for area Buy, Sell, Trade and FreeCycle groups, host a neighborhood yard sale, or drop-off at your nearest consignment or thrift store. Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing



Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing means taking meaningful actions to address significant disparities in housing needs and access to opportunity, replacing segregated living patterns with truly integrated and balanced living patterns, transforming racially and ethnically concentrated areas of poverty into areas of opportunity, and fostering and maintaining compliance with civil rights and fair housing laws.

The City of Lawrence, in

partnership with the Lawrence-Douglas County Housing Authority, will prepare an Assessment of Fair Housing as part of its obligations in receiving funding from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Over the next few months, the HUD-provided data and mapping tool will be used to examine difficult issues like racial and ethnic segregation, concentrated areas of poverty, and disparities in access to opportunity, and disproportionate housing needs.

Input from residents is a critical part of developing a strong fair housing plan. A survey will be distributed to begin discussing issues facing our community, and a chance for citizens to tell us what is most important to them. We also encourage citizens to attend upcoming meetings or participate in the online survey platform Lawrence Listens (www.lawrenceks.org/lawrence-listens) to engage in a community conversation about fair housing issues.

In August, a final assessment will be published with recommendations and strategies that outline what role the City can play in furthering fair housing for all residents.





Lawrence Parks and Recreation, along with several community partners, are sponsoring the Lawrence Summer Food Program again. Children between ages 1-18 can get a free breakfast and lunch every weekday in the summer at several locations around town.
