Oak Hill Headstone Conservation Project is Underway

With the Oak Hill Headstone Conservation Project, volunteers and specialists are working hard to restore the physical state of headstones in Oak Hill Cemetery, but the work is also much more than that. The conservation is about honoring and respecting those who have died.

The goal of the project is to conserve 53 headstones in need of repair at Oak Hill Cemetery. Headstones were selected for conservation based on their condition. The goal of the conservation work is to uphold the integrity of the stone.

The project is being led by Pacific Coast Conservation and the Douglas County Historical Society (DCHS) Oak Hill Cemetery Program Committee, with funding from the City of Lawrence and other sources. The committee became a standing committee under the umbrella of the Watkins Museum of History last vear.

Pacific Coast Conservation, which is based in Denver, Co., began the work in fall 2022 along with a group of dedicated volunteers. Together, they cleaned more than 250 historic headstones, researched correct placement of headstones, and performed other tasks as needed. More than 150 volunteer hours have been contributed so far during this first phase of work.

While much was accomplished in Phase 1, there is still more to do! Volunteers will resume cleaning headstones in spring 2023 when Pacific Coast Conservation returns to Lawrence and completes the work they started in the fall.

Additional volunteers are welcome to join for spring 2023. The DCHS Oak Hill Cemetery Program Committee is hosting a program for volunteers to learn how to clean headstones.
