Central Station opens and bus routes change

Change is coming! To support the new Central Station location, Lawrence Transit is preparing to implement new routes that go into effect on Tuesday, January 2, 2024.

City and University staff have worked closely with the public since late 2020 to explore new route ideas, discuss new on-demand service models for overnight and Sunday, and add value for existing and new passengers.

To get ready for the changes coming to Lawrence Transit in 2024, check out these resources below.

Central Station. The new facility will have eight covered bays for Lawrence Transit buses, as well as bays for K-10 Connector and Greyhound services.

Amenities will include public restrooms, an indoor waiting area, bike racks and bike lockers, and digital signs with bus arrival information. Bus drivers will have access to improved features, including restrooms and a breakroom. Lawrence Transit worked with artist Tyler Kimball to produce several works of blown glass art that have been incorporated into the site (art pictured above).

Downtown Station. Upon completion of Central Station, five routes will continue to serve Downtown Lawrence. More than \$1.6 million of state funds have been awarded for a new Downtown Station, and the bulk of public outreach, site selection, and concept design is anticipated to happen in 2024, with construction likely in 2025.

INTRODUCING OUR ONLINE SYSTEM FOR PERMITS AND LICENSES Enterprise Permitting & Licensing

We're introducing a new, more streamlined system for our permitting and licensing services. Enterprise Permitting and Licensing (EPL) will launch on Monday, Feb. 5, 2024.

The new system moves many of our manual processes online and will provide numerous benefits for our community members. Our staff is looking forward to more efficiently turning around our permitting and licensing services once we've fully integrated this process. Other benefits of this new system include:

- 24-hour availability! The online platform is accessible 24-hours a day, seven-days a week, so you can apply anytime you want.
- One place to log in! There is one login for the entire system. Whether you're securing rental licensing or applying for a right-of-way permit, they are all now included within a single platform.
- Access to everything in one place! Our customers will have access to their entire license history in one place.

Enterprise Permitting & Licensing will encompass all the City's current permitting and licensing systems:

- · Business licensing
- Contractor licensing
- Rental licensing
- · Building permits
- · Special event permits
- · Right-of-way permits
- Planning submittals

Our staff is working diligently to ensure a seamless transition for our customers when we switch over. As part of the transition, staff will accept only emergency permits and licenses for one week from Friday, Jan. 26, 2024 at 4 p.m. through Friday, February 2, 2024. This allows our team to focus on implementing the system switch. Please plan accordingly and submit any needed permit and license applications before or after this week.

LKPD begins 46th Basic Training Academy this January

For a demanding, yet rewarding 18 weeks, Lawrence Kansas Police Department (LKPD) recruits will gain the knowledge, discipline, and skills required to help keep our city safe and secure, when the department's 46th Basic Training Academy begins on January 8, 2024.

At the approval of the Kansas Law Enforcement Training Center (KLETC), LKPD operates a satellite police academy here in Lawrence. Instructors are current Lawrence, Kansas Police Officers who design, teach and certify new recruits as Police Officers in the State of Kansas. The Academy is meticulously structured to encompass a diverse curriculum, including legal, tactical and communication areas of study.

Based on the framework of the U.S. Constitution and established case law, recruits learn their legal ability to investigate crimes, patrol the streets, and help keep our city safe from crime.

Tactically, mentors subject recruits to a barrage of challenges designed to build resilience, create endurance drills, produce high-stress simulations, and design real-life scenarios to prepare officers to react decisively in dynamic and often unpredictable situations.
