The Prairie Park Nature Center is getting an update! This vital community resource is expanding its footprint and nature-focused programming thanks to an Open Space grant from the Douglas County Heritage Conservation Council. The grant funds a a multi-faceted project focused on Mary's Lake that involves restoring shoreline habitat, building a larger fishing dock, updating educational signage, and expanding conservational programming. The project will include a collaboration for internships with students at Haskell Indian Nations University.

Prairie Park anticipates wrapping up the project by May 2026.

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Checking in on Downtown Development

Exciting changes are coming to Downtown Lawrence with several new projects actively in the works. The area is always hustling and bustling with activity – and right now it's booming with new development!

Press Yards is a redevelopment project that will convert approximately 70,000 square feet of vacant industrial space into an energetic, mixed-use office, entertainment, and retail space. Located on the east side of Massachusetts St. between 6th & 7th streets – in the former Lawrence Journal-World building – this project will also bring the famous Kansas City-based barbeque restaurant Q39 to Lawrence.

The **Turnhalle building** is an iconic historic structure located at the corner of 9th & Rhode Island streets. Originally constructed in 1869, this is the oldest standing community building in the city and has been the subject of remarkable preservation achievements.

Currently, this building is being restored to its original use as a community gathering space. The main floor will have a stage and balcony, and is naturally suited for theater, music performances, movies and special events. The basement will have a restaurant to support the main level as well as operate independently. **New apartments** are coming to 815 and 821 Vermont St., filling two long-time vacant lots. The buildings will have commercial space on the main floor with one- and two-bedroom apartments on the second and third floors.

Located on the east side of the 1000 block of New Hampshire Street, **New Hampshire Street Lofts** will be a four-story, mixed-use, affordable housing development project for senior residents.

The first floor will have approximately 15,000 square feet of live-work space and the three upper levels will have 54,000 square feet of affordable senior housing. Amenities will include a community room, exercise facility, computer room with free Wi-Fi, rooftop deck, and green space.

Finally, the City is working to redevelop three of its parking lots into **mixed-use developments**: 711 New Hampshire St., 1020 Vermont St., and 826 Vermont St. These pedestrian-friendly projects are expected to add commercial and residential space to enhance the overall vision of Downtown.

Bulk Pick-Up 101

When you submit a bulk pick-up request, if the amount of bulk items is excessive or any items are subject to fees, a supervisor will evaluate the site to assess the appropriate cost for the pickup.

These charges will then appear on your next utility bill. So, it's a good idea to be prepared and understand our bulk-pickup process.

How to Schedule a Pickup

Scheduling a pick-up for bulky items is a breeze. Just call us at 785-832-3032 or fill out the online form at <u>lawrenceks.org/swm/trash</u>. Whether it's a trusty old couch, a clunky appliance, or even automobile tires, we've got you covered.

To ensure your bulk items are picked up without any hiccups, plan ahead. Make sure to submit your request well in advance and keep an eye out for any additional charges that may apply. By being proactive, you can avoid surprises and ensure a smooth move-out process.

Recycle and Reuse

Before you throw something out, think about recycling! Obsolete electronic equipment, cardboard boxes, newspapers, plastic bags, and many other recyclable materials don't belong in the trash.
