Frequently Asked Questions

I am going to be adding a deck and a garden shed to the house this spring. Do I need any type of building permit for that work?

A Residential Building Permit is required if the deck is 30" above grade. Elevation drawings, plot plan, and framing detail are needed with application submittal. A homeowner can perform the work if the homeowner resides on the property. A City of Lawrence license is required for any subcontractors hired to do the concrete and framing work.

What about for re-roofing my home, do I need a permit for that?

A Residential Building Permit is not required if you are re-shingling your home. If any structural work is projected then a Residential Building Permit is required. Elevation drawings and framing details are needed with application submittal. A homeowner can perform the work if the homeowner resides on the property. Any contractors hired must have a city license

Improving Safety and Preparedness

On March 12, 2006, severe weather blew down trees, knocked out traffic signals and damaged property. City employees worked overtime to return Lawrence to its feet in just days. As Lawrence grows, we must be ready to meet new demands while improving existing service. In 2006, two new Fire Medical stations began operation, and a new pumper truck was added to help upgrade service. New digital tools like cameras and recorded interview rooms help law enforcement to work more accurately and efficiently.

Planning for the Future - Taking Us Where We Need To Go

A \$1.2 million federal grant helped replace a deteriorating 1960s-era runway. The new design allows larger planes to use the airport and protects planes from having to taxi across an active runway. Planning began for the new Wakarusa Water Reclamation Facility which is expected to treat 7 million gallons of wastewater a day, and can be expanded to process as much as 50 million gallons.

Lawrence, A Great Place to Live

With more than 640,000 visits in 2006, Lawrence Parks and Recreation offered over 700 classes and provided more than \$15,000 in youth scholarships. Public Transit provided an average of 1,600 rides a day with 47 percent of riders using the "T" for work and 18 percent for school. Recognizing that it is important to preserve our heritage, three historic buildings and two historic districts were added to the National Register of Landmarks.

Better Weather Means Be Prepared for Road Repairs

Swork. Public Street crews appreciate your cooperation in taking alternative routes and in helping keep construction zones safe.

Depending on the scope of repairs and the weather, the length of a project will vary. For example, a road overlay that doesn't involve curb replacement will take less time than an overlay where curbs are being replaced.

If there is going to be road construction, affected residents will receive written notice from the Department of Public Works prior to the project's start date. Where feasible, your notice will establish alternative routes. Be sure to review notices and mark your calendars. If you have questions about road work, call (785) 832-3134.
