## **Seasonal Sightings**



As you start getting back outside, keep an eye out for spring ephemerals! These beauties are one of the first signs of spring. Start looking for these wildflowers in March, and observe how the different flower species come and go throughout the season.

Spring ephemerals are wildflowers that complete their life cycles within a relatively short time frame. They sprout, flower, and seed out in just a few weeks. This must occur right in the sweet spot when it's warm enough that the flowers won't freeze, but early enough that trees and shrubs haven't shaded out the forest floor. Spring ephemerals can be found just as certain pollinator species become active, and they are the only sources of nectar and pollen for those early butterflies, bees, beetles, and moths. Some ephemerals bloom for just a few days, so keep your eyes peeled!

One of these short-lived wildflowers is known as bloodroot (A). Named for its blood red sap, these white flowers grow in colonies, with just one flower arising from a single leaf. Jack in the Pulpit (B) is a unique looking plant that smells like fungi in order to attract its pollinators, fungus gnats. Another species to look for is affectionately known as Dutchman's Breeches (C). These flowers grow in patches, bearing fern-like foliage and white flowers that resemble pantaloons. Trout lily (D) is named for its mottled leaves, which resemble the coloration of a brook trout. Mayapple (E) is a groundcover species with large, lobed leaves and a showy white flower hidden just under the leaves. See how many spring ephemeral species you can find this season!



# FEATURED FRIEND Phoebe the Virginia Opossum

Miss Phoebe is one of our most controversial nature center residents-people either love Opossums or find them creepy. Opossums are definitely quirky critters, but these quirks are what make them so special! Known for rifling through our garbage, hissing, and playing dead, opossums are highly unique mammals. They are exceptional climbers, having semi-opposable thumbs and pre-hensile tails that can wrap around branches and help them balance in the treetops. Opossums are also North America's only marsupial! Like kangaroos, mother opossums carry their young in a pouch on their bellies. Babies remain in their mother's pouch, being nourished by her milk, for the first 2-3 months of their lives. After spending another couple of months riding around on the mama's back, these nocturnal critters spend their nights scavenging for food as independent adults. Opossums are nature's clean-up crew, feeding upon carrion and decaying plant matter. Their varied diets also include rodents, insects, and even ticks, making them effective pest control. Thank your local opossum next time you see one around the neighborhood!

## **Spring Sustainability Tips**

Plant a garden this spring! Growing your own food is one of the best ways to reduce your carbon footprint. By eating food that doesn't require long-distance transportation, wasteful packaging, or the use of harmful pesticides, you're giving Mother Nature a much-needed break. Also, plant some native wildflowers while you're at it to support pollinators and boost our local biodiversity.
