Jack – talking about new rental ordinance that is being worked on. What is our expectation of privacy in terms of who can live in your home. What are the international building codes that city should know about. What are the 7-8 big things that the city wants accomplished most importantly. What about our 4th amendment rights. How are our laws going to follow this? This hits the City Commission tomorrow.

Minutes: June – September we need to get these approved. If you did the minutes you are in charge of bringing the minutes. June – halk jacki / half aaron // july / aug – aaron // sept. - Jacki

Tony Krsnick – 8th & Penn Update. 55% is saying in good faith that they can get to this number. If you want Tony's cell phone he wants to be accessible. Had he met with the neighbors on the east side of NJ in the warehouse arts district and says all but 1 have said they are aok in the project. Talking about a lot of take out access. Adam Johnson then spoke on behalf of all of those who support this idea. They don't think that they can get to the 55% yet, so when or how do we allow this to bend? What is good for your profit vs. what is good for our neighborhood is what we are looking for. Mon. Sept. 23 – goes to the planning commission.

He then moved onto the NineDel lofts. 23(450)/16(650)/4(3) is the breakdown of apartments – looking for an ap loan. Looking to do modern contemporary building. Home Funds / Kansas Housing Resources. Wanting to name them the NIneDel lofts.

ELNA Meeting Minutes for 10/7/2013

Attendees at 7:10: Josh, Lane, Eric and Jesse Jay, Aaron, Phil, Cindy, KT, Brenda, Leslie, Boog, John, Mike, Bob Schumm, Sarah Minges, Michael Almon, Brendan, Cricket from MO, Grace. Josh: Hello and Welcome.

Minutes for July and August were distributed and may be discussed at the end of the meeting. Jump to 8th and Penn Devlopment, the Bistro/Nightclub.

Eric and Jesse Jay are at the new house in the 800 block of New Jersey. Struct/Restruct partner. Planning Commission gave approval with an extra year (2) years to comply with 55/45% Food/Alcohol. Q. What happens if the place is sold, does the variance start over? There was no discussion on an earlier time of closing. Leslie read from Planning Commission Minutes (paraphrased for minutes) where Tony K. "called it a bistro, that is softer than calling it a bar>.

The outdoor portion is bigger than the inside portion. Planning staff came up with 2 options? – go with 55/45 and an option that would suggest a smaller site plan? Rezoning goes to CC tomorrow. To change zoning to CS (commercial strip with overlay). Bob Schumm (he's not heard all sides and is not taking a stance at this time, and speaks recognizing he does not wish to create a conflict of interest, as he is sitting with the architect on record for the project (Hernley Rep Mike Myers)). The original downtown / outdoor food sales reqs were for 65/35 and 75/25 for outdoor dining. By having 75 food it is outdoor dining not outdoor drinking. A fine line. Changed when a 700 NH restaurant lobbied a change to 55/45. You are either a restaurant with a bar or a bar with a restaurant. Some bars do outdoor drinking well and they would fit in any neighborhood. Others wouldn't. 45% in alcohol sales is a whole lot of alcohol being consumed.

Mike M. (architect of record) – He is going to have to ship in food. There's not room for him to have a hood in kitchen. He may grill outdoors. Tony's got to get people to come and eat there in order to be successful, he is counting on our support.

Potential scenarios – if in 2 years he doesn't get there he'll ask to continue as he has been. Or, another scenario, he is dependent on his customers. He's at 2 years and gets a review – what if the 55% isn't fulfilled? We're not sure. There is a risk of the extra grace period. Will it open up a can of worms, in that other developers will want the same treatment?

Bob reads more from the minutes – Commissioner Culver asks what happens if they don't hit 55% in one year, then staff works with them and if it wasn't met in the 2nd year they'd lose the condition. So the extra year may give them 3 years rather than the standard 2.

Would anyone support the Pig as the bar there? Or would we support the Wheel being the bar? It sets a precedent. We hope it is the right bar. It probably will be, we hope. But will the next one also be a good one? We hope. It could get sold to the next bar owner.

But, this could be an incubator to big things, why would we stop that?

We support that he gets a bar with the 55/45 rule with a Midnight Closing. That is the motion that passed. It is a compromise.

One more issue, no meetings with the neighbors. Tony had his landlord call the tenants. That could be intimidating. He has talked to some folks. Not others. Segue to Eric and Josie.

Comments: Tony has not contacted Eric. They are on the fence. It is a great idea, but it has to be done right. Living next to a bar can be tough. They live at 10^{th} and Ohio and they get bad bar behavior over there. This place has potential for a large outdoor event. It shouldn't go past 10 p.m. during the week. They could hear the downtown goonies movie at 10^{th} and OH, and also at 7^{th} and NH. The idea is great but it sets a big precedent. A one year restriction to 55/45. Midnight Closing. Close earlier during the week. The distance from campus and Downtown may have a slowing impact on them. There is an automotive repair shop across the alley from Eric and Josie. East Lawrence is a _____ neighborhood - <<di>Rugged? Compelling?>>.

Property Rights go both directions. The area is developing well. It could use a good bar. Conditional Use could be applied. This is a good situation for C.U. It is a good project but the risk is it is not a desirable bar and it becomes a neighborhood drain. Conditional zoning worked well 5 years ago for the Brook Creek NA. It also was a good solution for Krause Dining. Fulfilling the food for a kitchen of that size will be tough! Coffee counts towards the food side. They'll make a go of it with food trucks, outdoor cooking and shipments.

There was to be a meeting of Cider Gallery tenants but it was cancelled. The tenants are not well informed.

There was a loud party at the Cider Gallery Saturday night. Nuisance laws go into effect at 11 p.m. There was a fight at this party. The Poehler Building poll / petition was not done well. 3 people gave 3 different accounts for what was on the petition – one to support no alcohol, one to support 55/45, one to support a bar. What did the petitions really say?

We believe the plan is to have a place for the party to go to after the Cider Gallery closes down. We want 55/45 and midnight close. Our letter did not state the midnight close succinctly. Bob Schumm recommends we ask for a deferment and a meeting with the developers and the neighbors. Work out our issues, and present solutions to the CC. That is easier for the CC. We zone the ground, but we conditionally use ties to the owner.

Burroughs Creek Trail

Many folks that are here <Mike A, Mike M, Bob S, and others> have worked hard to make this go. Mike A brought a letter of support for the extension of BCT north of 11th to city hall and beyond. Mike M brought a big map and Mike A passed out smaller maps. Mike M. likes the BCT, and would love to see it circle the whole town. His idea came about in discussions with Josh about potential school closings. If NY school were closed, how would the kids walk to Pinkney? Mike thought, "Under the bridges!!" No busy street crossings. A trail could have historical placards, art, podcasts, smartphone scan thingys to get you to the internets! Every new development has trails with signs, etc. Mike asked the city engineer if they could make the new sidewalk on the new Delaware extension 8 feet. He said sure! And now the 9 Del development will also go to 8 foot sidewalks. Other groups are talking trails. McGrew and Bert Nash are looking at a trail on the river behind the old VFW. The Kansas Trails Council also wants a trail that would take the trail from constant park to burcham and to be extended all the way to the Westar plant. KT pointed out the dream has always been a branch that would go across the kaw as a footbridge. That is proposed and drawn to come over close to the 8th st. boat ramp in N Law. There is a lot of vision for where this trail could go. It takes \$\$ for a bridge.

Bob Schumm says on the south end of BCT there is a grant to pave it from about 22nd st to 29th st. and a piece of wetland may be being donated and that leaves the city about one block short of a connector to the new SLT bike trail that is being built. They are also going to be rebuilding the 6th and Iowa intersection, and it could take only about \$40,000 to engineer and execute an 8 foot bike path connector through that intersection. He will be asking for 10% (1% - I didn't

catch the number) of some financial allocation to be budgeted for walking/bike paths. If there were a pot of \$\$ we'd be able to get stuff done. We are not pro-active enough. The SLT bike path is well-used.

Question – is there a plan for better / safer biking by city hall. It is tough coming off the bridge. Answer. East to west would connect to the new path. Skirts parking garage and down to tracks.

Wed. night is the inter-modal plan at the natatorium. The BCT is not in the plan and it should be. If we go we should stress that. BCT has the potential to connect to a route that could truly circle the city.

And KT suggests that we ask for a budget line for maintenance of brick streets. There's no budget for that today.

Engineering can begin on this trail to be ready when the money comes. They will be putting in a pipeline running under the river. The cost is about \$1 million. Or hang it from a bridge for the same one mil and get a walking bridge, too.

We should always be looking for opportunities to extend and now there is a partial trail being built so let's get public funding to go to fill in those gaps. So that it will extend from Hobbs terminus to Robinson Park and beyond. These are multiple channels to accomplish the same thing. Motion was approved to sign on to Mike A's letter as ELNA.

Henry Furtunado wants to do history signs on BCT. Info given to Mike M.

Crosswalks at Hobbs Park – 11^{th} and Delaware. Brendon came out to garner our support for a N/S crosswalk at 11^{th} and Delaware. We moved to support and Aaron and Brandon will work together to draft a letter to get a discussion started with the city.

President's report. Who's next? All officer positions may be open at the annual meeting.

Coordinator report: Block Party! Deposited \$1000+ We spent 600 and took in \$1000. Pretty good. Lotta dough from T-shirts. The T shirt vendor (blue collar) may take special orders for custom clothing gear with our logo. Thank you notes will get done. There were some things for the lost and found. We want to have recycling at our functions, and a good raffle item may be a lifetime membership!

The Newsletter will come out in October. Looking for company logos for donating companies to go in newsletter.

Halloween in Lawrence. A NY School Mom is pushing to make Halloween be a fun event in the neighborhood. Turn on your lights and be ready for trick or treating kids! Make a big deal of it.

Grants: there were 2 grants requested. We extended the deadline. We (ELNA) could apply for a grant. We need tables and other miscellaneous tools.

LAN. They've discussed Domestic Drones. CN zoning. Rental Registrations. Brenda will cover Thursday's LAN meeting for Cindy.

HRC. Our group of houses will go in October of November to CC. Lynne Z has to write each one up individually. One house is up for sale.

There's a proposed expansion of the Quik shop at 19th and Haskell. They want variances for more pumps? They want too many pumps and the neighborhood doesn't like that. 4 pumps = good.

PTO / Site Council. Fall cleanup is on 10/26 from 8:30 to 11:30. Bagels and coffee early. There's a new USD groundskeeper. He's into it and there'll be lots of mulch and other materials available. Site Council has been talking bond issues. Meeting tomorrow.

Cultural District Task force. . A small group of ELNA's met and will have final submission. The treanor vision – 3 people showed up to do the vision for the facelift of the chosen corridor. They are proposing a charette. We think this is putting the cart before the horse. Crace and Mandy are tasked with coming up with 2 models to be considered. The treanor vision should not be pursued at least until the models are developed. Schedule of events:

Tomorrow there is a lunch meeting at city hall.

Breakfast meeting with Treanor on Octover 15th.

Charette is saturday the 19th. They want us there from 8 to 9 and from 4 to 5.

We are leaning towards nixing the treanor vision and we moved that (paraphrased) we empower our reps to postpone the treanor vision work for the reasons we cited.

Greetings Neighbors!



There is a lot going on in the neighborhood and with all of the excitement I fear we have not given enough attention to the wonderful work led by Dennis Domer & accomplished with significant help from others. That group has done a remarkable job of documenting many of the fantastic old

homes in our neighborhood, documenting them in a meaningful way that will help to tell East Lawrence's story for... well, forever.

As one result of this endeavor, you may have heard of the efforts to list a number of East Lawrence homes on the local historic registry. Perhaps you have even received notification that a close neighbor of yours has a home up for this honor. Perhaps you have questions or concerns regarding the whole thing. This is too small of a space to address all the questions one might have but I can tell you that the ELNA board is 100% behind these efforts. Not to say we don't have our own individual concerns, but as a group we realize the benefits greatly outnumber the negatives. If you have questions about the process, please feel free to ask any of us!

What I would like to do, is touch on the term "vernacular architecture", a key definition in describing what makes our neighborhood homes so special and what has driven much of the interest in Dr. Domer's team's work. I've done some searching, looking for a concrete definition of the term and cannot find a universal one... so instead I offer what comes to my own mind when I think about what vernacular architecture means.

Vernacular architecture is, in essence, architecture of necessity. Vernacular homes are sometimes built, at least in part, by the home owner themselves. They are built from materials at hand... materials that the area's natural resources present to the builder – there was no Home Depot in the late 1800's (though there may have been a Cottin's!). There was no architect involved; often the craftsman was also the designer, following patterns of the day as a guide in the design. You can see these patterns in these homes, yet each is always different from the next.

Vernacular architecture has been defined as "ordinary", but that definition no longer applies... in today's world there is nothing remotely "ordinary" about it.

For instance, observe the houses on your block. Living in East Lawrence, chances are good that your block or one near has at least one late 1800's era brick home. Those bricks were likely fired very near the site that the home was built! The formed clay was stacked and the fire was built inside the stack. The bricks had varying degrees of hardness and durability depending on where they were in the pile and it was up to the mason to sort through and select the hardest bricks for the exterior and the softer for the inner wythes of the walls. You could break those soft bricks with your bare

hands so the masons had to know what they were doing! Walk up to one of those houses and look for a random brick that is significantly worn away... if you find one you'll know the mason missed one.

Move on up to the roof structure of that same house and you'll find rough lumber cut from the trees of the area. Varying species, varying sizes, the lumber is rough, oldgrowth, and undeniably beautiful. I've seen walnut roof plank boards up to 20"+ wide. Just try and head to the lumber yard and pick one of those up; again, nothing ordinary about it.

Working class homes were vernacular in style and East Lawrence has a marvelous collection of them. We've lost some over time, others have been reborn. The ELNA board very much wishes to thank Dr. Domer and his team for their efforts in documenting the homes we still have.
























The Lawrence Fruit Tree Project Interview - Lane Eisenbart

Many of you have heard about the Lawrence Community Orchard in our Thursday Enews, and in past issues of this paper newsletter. The Orchard consists of perennial fruit bearing trees, and is located on Garfield St. where it ends at Burroughs Creek, one block south of 13th St, and east of Delaware St. The land itself is allotted to the Orchard as part of the City of Lawrence's Common Ground Program. The Lawrence Community Orchard, however, is but one of the many projects of a larger group, The Lawrence Fruit Tree Project. Many of LFTP's (the preferred acronym for the Lawrence Fruit Tree Project) projects and project leaders live right here in East Lawrence.

Do you have a website? Yes! What is your mission/objective? The Lawrence Fruit Tree Project provides a community-based solution to a critical and growing need for access to healthy food. We work to educate, assist, and inspire the public to grow, steward, and utilize perennial food plants. Our aim is to build community, increase local food security, and create direct, lasting bonds between people and their urban environment.

Who are your primary group members? Skyler Adamson, Eric Farnsworth, Byron Wiley and Jason Hering

How did your group form? Five years ago, Skyler had the idea of starting a group whose purpose would be to promote the growth of fruit trees and perennial food plants throughout the city. He was encouraged by KU Biology and Environmental Studies professor Kelly Kindscher to start the group and soon found fellow perennial food plant enthusiasts, Eric and Byron to join him. Jason later became a committed member of the group as well.

Does the Fruit Tree Project have sites other than on the Burroughs Creek Trail? At New York School at 9th & New Jersey St, at ECM on KU Campus, and a few other small plantings throughout the community.

Where do you see your group going? What's your future vision? It would be nice if more & more people came to see the growing fruit trees in public, and the sharing of locally grown produce as a normal and essential community activity. My personal hope is that our efforts can demonstrate that this is possible, and that people will see what a good time we are having growing and eating fruit, and make the effort to help plant and care for fruit trees. LFTP is also in the process of trying to develop more leadership. We are looking into gaining non-profit status so that one member could be paid as the outreach coordinator, but

would also like to find more people in the community who would be interested in taking more of a leadership role.

Why is this project important to you? Food is essential to everyone, and with a relatively small amount of work, it is possible to make delicious fruit available to people, as an act of community generosity. This is incredibly empowering, and it does not just benefit the person who eats the fruit, but it benefits everyone who lives in a community that has chosen to be that generous.

How would you like the people of East Lawrence to help with your endeavors? The simplest and best way for people to get involved with the Lawrence Fruit Tree Project is to come to one of our work days, see what we are doing, and what part of that fits their skills and interests. Look in the ELNA enews and on the LFTP website for upcoming workdays.

Do You Know About the Penn House? - Lane Eisenbart

Smallish, lightly colored, set back from the street, and surrounded by a chain-link fence, the house at 1035 Pennsylvania Street seems innocuous at first sight. You might even miss it, if you aren't looking. But, did you know, that the building at 1035 Pennsylvania, known only as "The Penn House", has been in operation for over 43 years and is actually a thriving hub of community services for people on the east side and Lawrence at large?

No? You didn't know? Neither did I, so I asked Kyle Roggenkamp, Penn House Director, a few questions.

What is the Penn House?

Funded by grants from United Way, Community Development Block Grants, funds from several small philanthropic institutions, and donations from community members, Penn House is an outlet for the Ballard Center Human Services Programs. (The Ballard Center is a larger non-profit community organization, with its headquarters on Elm Street in North Lawrence.) The Penn House is a strictly not-for-profit public service organization working toward the goals of "stabilizing crisis and mobilizing resources that promote change toward self-sufficiency for those facing poverty" in Douglas County.

Who does the Penn House serve?

It serves approximately 7,000 low-income Douglas County residents each year. The majority of those residents live within walking distance of the Penn House, says Kyle. Services are available to all Douglas County residents who meet 185% federal poverty level guidelines. Anyone enduring short-term financial insecurity is encouraged to seek assistance. Some proofs of residence and income eligibility are required.

What kind of services are offered at Penn House?

Services offered at the Penn House location include; rent and utility assistance, a free open-access clothing pantry, a

Meet the Neighbors

Hello East Lawrence!

We're your new neighbors at 1000 New York, which for the next year we're calling The Pilot Balloon Church-House. We are Rubber Repertory—an experimental theatre company founded in 2002 in Austin, TX after we earned our Theatre degrees from KU. You may have heard about our artists' colony project, and we wanted to say a few words about what we're up to.

While the two of us will be living here the entire year, we've invited two additional artists at a time to stay with us for periods between one and three weeks. So over the course of the year, 73 different artists (from ten states and four countries!) will be living and working in the church. We're not imagining the space as a performance venue, but as a retreat in which artists of many disciplines can escape distraction and concentrate on their work. Having been in the church at a house party back in the late 90's, we acted

food pantry, a selection of free toys and household goods, and seasonal school supplies and holiday gifts and meals programs. Greater Ballard Center programs such as the senior citizen food commodities, diaper pantry, the "Suitable for Work" professional attire closet, tax return preparation assistance, and referrals to other agencies and services can also be applied for at the Penn House.

How can you receive services?

Kyle says you should just come in fill out some papers.

How can you help the Penn House?

Volunteer! The Penn House has only one paid employee, and that's Kyle. All other work is done by volunteers. As a volunteer, you might participate in a community outreach effort such as distributing flyers, you might process donations, hand out food at the pantry, or help with phones, computers or paperwork. Walk-in volunteers are welcome as well as preplanned helpers.

Donate! The Penn House accepts all donations during open hours (Monday through Friday 8-4.) No donation of any kind is ever turned away. Every item is either distributed in house, or passed along to another community outlet. "Every item," emphasizes Kyle. As example of the Penn House's commitment to utilizing every donation; even stained, ripped, or otherwise unwearable clothing is given to a Kansas City company to be shredded and turned into eco-friendly insulation.

Is there any one thing that East Lawrence can do for the Penn House?

"Talk about it," says Kyle. He'd like everyone to make sure that people know the Penn House is there, that people can go there for help when they need it, and to donate if they ever have a little extra.

Self-Load Only - Compost and Woodchip Sale Saturday, October 5, 8am – 3pm

Will Load – Compost and Woodchip Sale Thursday – Saturday, October 10-12, 8am – 3pm

On Saturday, October 5th, self-loading pick-up truck or trailer loads will be \$10 per load and small quantities will be free.

On Thursday, October 10th - Saturday October 12th, the city will load trucks and trailers. Cost is still \$10 per bucket load, equivalent to two cubic yards.

Please bring a shovel, and a tarp to secure woodchips in trucks and trailers to prevent littering the roadway. Both events CASH only. Events are rain or shine. Thursday through Saturday, October 10, 11, 12 from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. or until the supply is depleted.

Compost and woodchips are not intended for commercial applications but rather for the citizens of Lawrence. Dump truck quantities are not allowed. The city cannot load trucks with ladder racks.

The event will be held at the city's Wood Recovery and Composting Facility located at 1420 E. 11th Street which is east of 11th and Haskell Avenue, over the railroad tracks.
